SEEDY SATURDAY 2024

Mark your calendars! The Horticultural Societies of Fergus & District and Elora & Salem are jointly organizing the 5th annual Centre Wellington Seedy Saturday on Saturday, March 16th, 2024. The event will be held in the Aboyne Hall and adjacent hallway of the Wellington County Museum & Archives on Wellington County Road 18 in Fergus. Doors will be open to the public from 10:30 am till 2:30 pm. As in previous years, admission will be free of charge to all.





There will be something of interest for everyone, regardless of age, gardening experience, and expertise as a seed enthusiast. The organizing committee Jude Dowling, Sharon Leggett, and Fred Mallett have lined up a diverse group of vendors, community groups, and advisory services. Workshops will be held in the Reading Room of the Archives on the topics of saving, storing, and starting of seeds, as well as vermiculture and vermicomposting (i.e. gardening with worms!).

If any members are willing to donate seeds for the free exchange table, all donations will be gratefully accepted. Seed envelopes will be made freely available at monthly General Meetings. Envelopes should be labelled to show the seed variety, colour (if flowering varieties), and the year the seeds were harvested.

Please plan to join us, browse the vendor tables, exchange seeds, meet your neighbours, share stories and gather information on a wide variety of topics, such as genetic diversity, pollination, working with nature, etc. A Children's Activity Corner will also be available for the youngsters in attendance. More detailed information will follow as we get closer to the date.

We will soon be in need of volunteers to help with the following duties:

Advertising (before the date) – placing posters, distributing brochures, word of mouth, etc.
 Children's Activity Corner - occupying visitors' children with various activities on the day. (Note: an OPP Criminal Records Check is required for volunteers working with children)
 Reception Desk – greeting participants, giving help and directions, as required, and promoting the wonderful benefits of horticultural society membership.
 Set-Up - assisting vendors and advisors to move their displays and goods into the building.
 Tear-Down - assisting vendors and advisors to remove their displays out of the building.


